» Diagnosis and Care of Alzheimer's Patients

Alzheimer's is the most common form of dementia. An estimated 26.6 million people worldwide were afflicted by Alzheimer's in 2006 and this number may quadruple by 2050. Although each person experiences Alzheimer's in unique ways, there are many common symptoms. The earliest observable symptoms are often thought to be age related concerns or manifestations of stress. The most commonly recognized early symptom is memory loss, such as difficulty remembering recently learned facts. As the disease advances, symptoms include confusion, irritability and aggression, mood swings, language breakdown, long-term memory loss and the general withdrawal of the person as senses decline.

The cause and progression of Alzheimer's disease are not well understood. Because Alzheimer's cannot be cured and is degenerative, management of patients is essential. ***Don't miss out on the opportunity to learn the latest in research and care of Alzheimer's disease!***

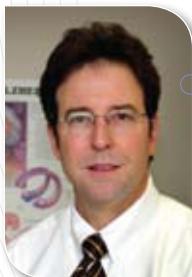


Frederick E. Munschauer, III, M.D.

Dr. Munschauer is a board-certified specialist in neurology and internal medicine with the subspecialty in critical care. He is the Irvin & Rosemary Smith Professor and Chair, Department of Neurology of the State University of New York at Buffalo School of Medicine and Biomedical Sciences.

Dr. Munschauer received his medical degree from McGill University and completed an internship and residency in Internal Medicine and a residency in Neurology at The Johns Hopkins Hospital. He also completed a Fellowship in Neurological and Neurosurgical Intensive Care at The National Hospital for Nervous Disease, London, UK. Dr. Munschauer is a member of the American Academy of Neurology, the American Medical Association, the American Heart Association, the American Society of Neuroimaging, and the Society of Critical Care Medicine. He is currently a member of the National Board of Directors for the National MS Society, as well as serving as a Board Member of the WNY Region's American Heart Association.

Dr. Munschauer is also Medical Director of the Research Center for Stroke and Heart Disease at Kaleida Health. His research interests in cerebrovascular disease include vascular disease prevention and health care delivery.
